The President bids the collect, saying

Let us pray.

All Almighty God, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hidden: cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy name; through Christ our Lord. Amen.

The president says

Our Lord Jesus Christ said: The first commandment is this: 'Hear, O Israel, the Lord our God is the only Lord. You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength.'

The second is this: 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' There is no other commandment greater than these. On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets.

All Amen. Lord, have mercy.

The president then says

God so loved the world that he gave his only Son Jesus Christ to save us from our sins, to be our advocate in heaven, and to bring us to eternal life.

Let us confess our sins in penitence and faith, firmly resolved to keep God's commandments and to live in love and peace with all.


All Most merciful God, Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, we confess that we have sinned in thought, word and deed.

The Liturgy of the Word

THE FIRST READING 1 Corinthians 3:1–11

And so, brothers and sisters, I could not speak to you as spiritual people, but rather as people of the flesh, as infants in Christ. I fed you with milk, not solid food, for you were not ready for solid food. Even now you are still not ready, for you are still of the flesh. For as long as there is jealousy and quarrelling among you, are you not of the flesh, and behaving according to human inclinations? For when one says, 'I belong to Paul', and another, 'I belong to Apollos', are you not merely human?

What then is Apollos? What is Paul? Servants through whom you came to believe, as the Lord assigned to each. I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the growth. So neither the one who plants nor the one who waters is anything, but only God who gives the growth. The one who plants and the one who waters have a common purpose, and each will receive wages according to the labour of each. For we are God's servants, working together; you are God's field, God's building.

According to the grace of God given to me, like a skilled master builder I laid a foundation, and someone else is building on it. Each builder must choose with care how to build on it. For no one can lay any foundation other than the one that has been laid; that foundation is Jesus Christ.

This is the word of the Lord.AllThanks be to God.



The president says



Therefore with angels and archangels, and with all the company of heaven,


we proclaim your great and glorious name, for ever praising you and saying:

Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.


In the same way, after supper he took the cup and gave you thanks;



The president and people receive communion.





The First Reading Job 38

The reader introduces the lesson by saying A reading from the Book of Job.

Then the Lord answered Job out of the whirlwind:
Who is this that darkens counsel by words without knowledge?
Gird up your loins like a man,
I will question you, and you shall declare to me.
Where were you when I laid the foundation of the earth?
Tell me, if you have understanding.
Who determined its measurements—surely you know!
Or who stretched the line upon it?
On what were its bases sunk,
or who laid its cornerstone
when the morning stars sang together
and all the heavenly beings shouted for joy?

'Or who shut in the sea with doors when it burst out from the womb? when I made the clouds its garment, and thick darkness its swaddling band, and prescribed bounds for it, and set bars and doors, and said, "Thus far shall you come, and no farther, and here shall your proud waves be stopped"?

'Have you commanded the morning since your days began, and caused the dawn to know its place, so that it might take hold of the skirts of the earth, and the wicked be shaken out of it?It is changed like clay under the seal, and it is dyed like a garment.Light is withheld from the wicked, and their uplifted arm is broken.

'Have you entered into the springs of the sea, or walked in the recesses of the deep? Have the gates of death been revealed to you, or have you seen the gates of deep darkness? Have you comprehended the expanse of the earth? Declare, if you know all this.

Where is the way to the dwelling of light, and where is the place of darkness, that you may take it to its territory and that you may discern the paths to its home? Surely you know, for you were born then, and the number of your days is great!

'Have you entered the storehouses of the snow, or have you seen the storehouses of the hail, which I have reserved for the time of trouble, for the day of battle and war?What is the way to the place where the light is distributed, or where the east wind is scattered upon the earth?

Who has cut a channel for the torrents of rain, and a way for the thunderbolt, to bring rain on a land where no one lives, on the desert, which is empty of human life, to satisfy the waste and desolate land, and to make the ground put forth grass?


'Has the rain a father, or who has begotten the drops of dew? From whose womb did the ice come forth, and who has given birth to the hoar-frost of heaven? The waters become hard like stone, and the face of the deep is frozen.

'Can you bind the chains of the Pleiades, or loose the cords of Orion?Can you lead forth the Mazzaroth in their season, or can you guide the Bear with its children?Do you know the ordinances of the heavens? Can you establish their rule on the earth?

'Can you lift up your voice to the clouds, so that a flood of waters may cover you?Can you send forth lightnings, so that they may go and say to you, "Here we are"?Who has put wisdom in the inward parts, or given understanding to the mind?Who has the wisdom to number the clouds? Or who can tilt the waterskins of the heavens, when the dust runs into a mass and the clods cling together?

'Can you hunt the prey for the lion, or satisfy the appetite of the young lions, when they crouch in their dens, or lie in wait in their covert?Who provides for the raven its prey, when its young ones cry to God, and wander about for lack of food?

THE SECOND READING Romans 15:14–21

The reader introduces the lesson by saying

A reading from Paul's letter to the Romans.

I myself feel confident about you, my brothers and sisters, that you yourselves are full of goodness, filled with all knowledge, and able to instruct one another. Nevertheless, on some points I have written to you rather boldly by way of reminder, because of the grace given me by God to be a minister of Christ Jesus to the Gentiles in the priestly service of the gospel of God, so that the offering of the Gentiles may be acceptable, sanctified by the Holy Spirit. In Christ Jesus, then, I have reason to boast of my work for God. For I will not venture to speak of anything except what Christ has accomplished through me to win obedience from the Gentiles, by word and deed, by the power of signs and wonders, by the power of the Spirit of God, so that from Jerusalem and as far around as Illyricum I have fully proclaimed the good news of Christ. Thus I make it my ambition to proclaim the good news, not where Christ has already been named, so that I do not build on someone else's foundation, but as it is written,

'Those who have never been told of him shall see,

and those who have never heard of him shall understand.'



CONFERENCE BIOGRAPHIES

The Reverend Dr. Jamie Hawkey, conference preacher

Jamie Hawkey is Dean and Director of Studies in theology at Clare College, Cambridge. Educated at Cambridge (M.A., M.Phil., Ph.D.) and at the Angelicum in Rome, he completed his doctoral work in ecclesiology under the supervision of the late Professor Daniel W. Hardy. Ordained to a curacy at St Mary's Portsea, in inner- city Portsmouth, Jamie then went to serve as a Minor Canon at Westminster Abbey between 2010 and 2015. He was Precentor from 2013 to 2015, and in addition to supervision of the Abbey's daily liturgical life, he was responsible for crafting and designing many of the special services that take place there, including, in 2014, the Vigil to mark the centenary of the outbreak of World War I; the television production of this service went on to win a BAFTA (British Academy of Film and Television Arts) award.

In addition to his current work in Cambridge, he serves on the International Anglican/Reformed Dialogue, is a member of the Malines Conversations Group, and chairs the U.K. Development Committee for the Anglican Centre in Rome, as well as the Anglican Centre's Golden Jubilee Appeal. Current projects include a chapter in Ashgate's forthcoming title, Song of God, which is co-edited with Ben Quash and Vernon White. He is assistant Director of Ordinands for the Diocese of Ely, and a Priest Vicar of Westminster Abbey.

Andrew Lumsden, organist for opening Eucharist

Born in 1962, Andrew Lumsden was educated at Winchester College and the Royal Scottish Academy of Music and Drama before going up to St. John's College, Cambridge as Organ Scholar. While there, he served as assistant to George Guest in training the choir and in playing the organ for services, concerts, broadcasts, and tours. After three years as Assistant Organist at Southwark Cathedral, he was appointed Sub-Organist at Westminster Abbey.

In 1992 Andrew was appointed Organist and Master of the Choristers at Lichfield Cathedral, whose choir regularly appeared on BBC radio and television. He oversaw the complete rebuilding and extension of the Cathedral's Hill organ by Harrison and Harrison.

In September 2002 he took up his current appointment as Organist and Director of Music at Winchester Cathedral, succeeding David Hill. During this time the choir has continued to record and broadcast frequently, and has toured extensively in Europe and the U.S.

As conductor of the Waynflete Singers, Andrew works regularly with major orchestras including Florilegium, the Philharmonia Orchestra, the London Mozart Players and the English Chamber Orchestra. He has also conducted choral courses in New York City, Pennsylvania, Québec, and Delaware, and, early in 2015, toured Australia and New Zealand. He will be returning to Auckland in 2018 to perform a recital in the opening series of the new Cathedral Organ.

Andrew Lumsden has appeared as organ soloist throughout the U.K. and abroad, including such diverse places as Bergen, San Francisco, Saint-Tropez, Harare, and Sydney.

Martin Neary, composer of opening Eucharist mass setting

Martin Neary was Organist and Master of Music at Winchester Cathedral (1972-87) and Westminster Abbey (1988-98). As a Chapel Royal Chorister, he sang at the 1953 Coronation, and was later Organ Scholar of Caius College, Cambridge. He was a prize-winner at the first St Alban's International Organ Competition in 1963, and made his first visit to the USA that year as a student at Tanglewood. He soon became recognised as a concert organist, playing at the Royal Festival Hall and touring widely. In 2004 he was organ soloist at the First Night of the BBC Proms.

As conductor, Martin Neary championed contemporary composers, and in particular commissioned liturgical works from John Tavener and Jonathan Harvey, many receiving their first performances at Winchester. His numerous recordings include a Purcell CD: *Music for Queen Mary* with the Abbey Choir, nominated for a Grammy. With the Winchester and Westminster Choirs he made 25 foreign tours, including performances in the Kremlin and Carnegie Hall.

Martin Neary continues his career as organist, conductor, composer and writer, founding the English Chamber Singers, with whom he toured Australia, and the RSCM Millennium Youth Choir. In 2005 he directed John Tavener's all night *Veil of the Temple* at the Holland Festival, and in 2007 he founded the West-Coast based Millennium Consort Singers, who have appeared at Disney Hall. He is Chief Guest Conductor of the Grand Rapids Choir of Men and Boys. Among his compositions are *Mass of the Redeemer*, commissioned by the Church of the Redeemer, Bethesda, Maryland, and the setting for the Opening Eucharist at this AAM Conference.

Martin Neary has twice served as President of the Royal College of Organists, and is Chairman of the Herbert Howells Society. Among his awards are Honorary Membership of AAM (1997), a Lambeth Doctorate of Music (2012) and his appointment as Lieutenant of the Royal Victorian Order, in recognition of his services at the funeral of Princess Diana.

John Rutter, keynote speaker

John Rutter was born in London in 1945 and received his first musical education as a chorister at Highgate School. He went on to study music at Clare College, Cambridge, where he wrote his first published compositions and conducted his first recording while still a student.

His compositional career has embraced both large and small-scale choral works, orchestral and instrumental pieces, a piano concerto, two children's operas, music for television, and specialist writing for such groups as the Philip Jones Brass Ensemble and the King's Singers. His larger choral works, Gloria (1974), Requiem (1985), Magnificat (1990), Psalmfest (1993) and Mass of the Children (2003) have been performed many times in Britain, North America, and a growing number of other countries.

He co-edited four volumes in the Carols for Choirs series with Sir David Willcocks, and, more recently, has edited the first two volumes in the new Oxford Choral Classics series, Opera Choruses (1995) and European Sacred Music (1996).

From 1975 to 1979 he was Director of Music at Clare College, whose choir he directed in a number of broadcasts and recordings. After giving up the Clare post to allow more time for composition, he formed the Cambridge Singers as a professional chamber choir primarily dedicated to recording, and he now divides his time between composition and conducting.

He has guest-conducted or lectured at many concert halls, universities, churches, music festivals, and conferences in Europe, Africa, North and Central America and Australasia.

In 1980 he was made an honorary Fellow of Westminster Choir College, Princeton, and in 1988 a Fellow of the Guild of Church Musicians. In 1996 the Archbishop of Canterbury conferred a Lambeth Doctorate of Music upon him in recognition of his contribution to church music. He was honoured in the 2007 Queen's New Year Honours List, being awarded a CBE for services to music. Most of John Rutter's sheet music is published by Oxford University Press.

Charter Travel LTD, conference organizers

A family business started in 1982 by Peter and Angela Baldwin, the aim at the outset to offer incoming groups from America professional advice appertaining to group travel within the UK boundaries. Although initially working in the general travel market, a chance meeting with David Lowry at Gatwick airport Christmas time 1986 started a long relationship with AAM that as endured to the present day.

During this time Peter and the family have helped organise four AAM conferences: 1987 in London with David Lowry, 1997 in Oxford again with David Lowry, 2007 in Durham with Ben Hutto and now 2017 with Michael Messina.

The relationship with AAM also changed the direction of the business and from the early nineties the general travel work gave way to more specialised work with choirs and cathedrals within the Anglican Church. Today that work encompasses the travel arrangements of dozens of Anglican choirs every summer at Cathedral homes all round the United Kingdom.

The business has grown from its humble beginnings in 1982 but is still very much a family orientated company and together with Peter and Angela, Simon who has been involved since 1997 is now supervising much of the day to day working arrangements and younger son Adam and his wife Sara assist with behind the scenes administration.

The motto Peter and Angela used as their guiding light all those years ago is still at the forefront of everything they do today "it must be good enough for us before it can be good enough for you."
