Welcome

Dear Friends,

Welcome to Dallas! More than four years ago (and three AAM presidents ago!) in November of 2018, six Dallas-based members of AAM were called to a meeting to discuss a possible conference. Now with nearly twenty local AAM members, several more up for membership consideration, having survived a global pandemic, and many personal and professional transitions, we are more than ready to finally host you, our dear colleagues from across the country for this conference.

At that first meeting, which seems like it was a decade ago, there was a lot of enthusiasm to share all the good things that were happening in sacred music in Dallas. There were many possible themes thrown around. The one that stuck was *Come with High and Holy Hymning*. This phrase, taken from the Easter hymn *He is risen*, brims with enthusiasm and energy. In the wake of the past three years of pandemic, during some of which people were banned from singing in many parts of the country, the text of this hymn feels particularly appropriate:

> He has burst his three days' prison; Let the whole wide earth rejoice: Death is conquered, we are free, Christ has won the victory.

Centering the Dallas conference on hymnody is particularly appropriate because the last time AAM visited this fair city in the summer of 1985, it commemorated the launch of the brand new *Hymnal 1982*. Much of the new service music and hymnody from that volume was introduced at the 1985 conference. We have found many ways through this week's conference to honor this heritage of Episcopal hymnody in Dallas. Chief among these is the creation of the *Dallas Hymnary*, which will receive its premiere this week. Our keynote lectures with Mother Barbara Cawthorne Crafton will also focus on hymnody's role in our faith. Many of our conference liturgies will commemorate hymnists and poets. And, of course, we look forward to rousing hymn singing from the AAM membership throughout the week!

We hope you also take advantage of the many offerings of the conference hotel, the Warwick Melrose. Conference attendees who stay at the Warwick will receive free daily continental breakfast, access to the outdoor pool, and a 10% discount at the hotel spa. But most of all, we hope that you will feel warmly welcomed to our city and have a wonderful week of fellowship, music, and discovery. Welcome to our city!

Dallas: An Unlikely Metropolis

A bank on the Trinity River, a mere creek except when flooding broad spreads of lowlands, was an unlikely place for a city. But that's where Tennessee lawyer John Neely Bryan built a rugged cabin in 1841, inadvertently founding what would become Dallas. Within 30 years the little city was bustling enough to attract railroads, soon making it a commercial crossroads. Trade in grains, leather and, especially, cotton powered great growth, followed by food processing and manufacture of textiles and leather products. The city's early economic importance was recognized by the 1912 opening of a Federal Reserve Bank branch. With the 1930 discovery of East Texas oil fields, Dallas became a center of the petroleum business. Rapid expansion after World War II saw the economy diversify into banking, wholesale and retail trade, healthcare and technology.

Tragically, Dallas will always be associated with the 1963 downtown assassination of President John F. Kennedy. The Texas School Book Depository building, from which – unless you believe various conspiracy theories – Lee Harvey Oswald fired the fatal shots, is now the Sixth Floor Museum at Dealey Plaza. It's well worth visiting for extensive historical displays. The city may have become even more infamous – internationally – thanks to over-the-top parodies on the TV series "Dallas," which aired from 1978 to 1991.

Although today Dallas proper has a population of "only" 1.3 million, it's the anchor of the fourth largest metropolitan area in the country, with 7.5 million residents. It's a place of sophistication as well as big money and raw energy. As a major draw for corporate headquarters – most recently Toyota – and with a highly diversified economy, the area continues to explode with new residents. Everywhere you look are new office towers and complexes, condos and apartment buildings and expanding college campuses. The Dallas Arts District is the largest such contiguous complex in the world, with buildings by celebrated architects including I.M. Pei, Norman Foster, Renzo Piano and Rem Koolhaas. The area is also home to Texas-size churches, with music programs to match.


Dallas/Fort Worth International Airport, opened in 1973 between the two cities, is the third busiest in the world for aircraft movements, and the second busiest for passenger traffic. Inside Dallas, and home to Southwest Airlines, is Love Field, which completed a new terminal in 2015.

Welcome to Big D!

The venue and organ descriptions throughout this book were written by Scott Cantrell.

Like Oak Lawn United Methodist across the street, the **Melrose** was designed by architect C.D. Hill. Opened in 1924, it's conveniently located at a crossroads of the Oak Lawn, Turtle Creek and Cedar Springs neighborhoods. With repeated updatings over the years, the Melrose was purchased in 2007 by Warwick Hotels and Restaurants, which has greatly expanded meeting facilities. The new Turtle Creek Grand Ballroom can accommodate as many as 500 people; the hotel's longstanding Library Bar is a popular meeting place.


Opened in 1916, Dallas' Eddie Bernice Johnson Union Station replaced separate stations that had served five different rail lines. Designed by Chicago architect Jarvis Hunt in understated Beaux Arts style, finished in white enameled brick, it's a rather modest sequel to Hunt's majestic Union Station in Kansas City. The postwar decline in passenger rail service took its toll, but the arrival of Amtrak service in 1974 began to reverse the building's fortunes. The DART light rail system connected to the station in 1996; expanded to 93 miles of track, it's one of the most extensive such systems in the country. The station is also one end of the Trinity Railway Express, connecting DFW Airport and Fort Worth. Renovated in 2008 at a cost of \$23 million, the building offers a variety of meeting and celebration spaces up to the 8,600 square foot Great Hall, with catering by Wolfgang Puck.





L. Graham Schultz currently serves as Organist and Choirmaster of S. Stephen's, Providence. There he oversees a professional choir in one of the nation's oldest Anglo-Catholic parishes. Previously he served as both Interim Director of Music and Associate Director of Music at Church of the Incarnation in Dallas, Texas and as Lloyd Cast Organ Fellow at the Cathedral of All Saints, Albany.

Schultz has been featured as a performer at conventions of the American Guild of Organists, Organ Historical Society, and Association of Anglican Musicians. He has been heard on BBC Radio 3's Choral Evensong, American Public Media's Pipedreams, and national broadcasts of With Heart and Voice. A graduate of the Interlochen Arts Academy, Cleveland Institute of Music, and Southern Methodist University, Graham also holds the Fellowship Certificate from the American Guild of Organists. His organ teachers include Stefan Engels, Todd Wilson, Thomas Bara, and Charlie Rigsby as well as harpsichord with James Richman and improvisation with George Baker.

AAM chaplain **Victoria R. Sirota** is an Episcopal priest, musician, lecturer and author. The Rev. Dr. Sirota holds degrees from Oberlin Conservatory of Music, Boston University and Harvard Divinity School, has given recitals in the United States and Europe, and has taught at Yale Divinity School and Institute of Sacred Music and Boston University. She has served as Rector of Saint John's Episcopal Church in Getty Square, Yonkers, NY, Canon Pastor and Vicar at The Cathedral of Saint John the Divine in New York, and Vicar of The Church of the Holy Nativity in Baltimore. Former National Chaplain for the American Guild of Organists, she is the author of articles, reviews and texts for hymns, cantatas and song cycles including collaborations with her husband, composer Robert Sirota. Recorded on Northeastern, Gasparo and Albany Records, her book *Preaching to the Choir: Claiming the Role of Sacred Musician* is available from Church Publishing.

Glenn Stroh is an organist, harpsichordist, conductor, and music educator based in Dallas, Texas. He is currently Organist and Choirmaster at St. Mark's School of Texas, home of one of the country's preeminent boy choirs.

Mr. Stroh has performed across the U.S. and Europe, including appearances as a solo artist on several historically significant instruments and as organist for international choir tours. His career as a church musician spans over two decades serving prominent music programs including Saint Michael and All Angels Episcopal Church and the Episcopal Church of the Transfiguration in Dallas,

Old Stone Church, Cleveland and Trinity Cathedral, Cleveland.

A seasoned teacher, choir trainer, and advocate for music education, he was recognized with the John H. Murrell Excellence in Teaching Award in 2017. Mr. Stroh holds a Bachelor of Music degree from Trinity University in San Antonio, a Master of Music in Historical Keyboards from the Oberlin Conservatory, Ohio, and was the recipient of a Fulbright Fellowship in 2009–2010.

St. Mark's School is a private college-preparatory school for boys in grades 1 through 12. It dates its history from 1906, but today's school is the product of a 1950 merger of two other schools. Patrons and alumni over the years have included quite a who's who in science, business, sports, arts and entertainment. Although officially nonsectarian, the school maintains an Episcopal priest as chaplain, and the extensive choral program, founded by Alec Wyton, provides Evensong services on the English cathedral model. Understated regional modernist buildings are united by covered walkways and informal courtyards.

The lofty chapel, opened in 1988, originally had a 1982 Neo-Baroque Roy Redman organ that was moved from the previous chapel. In 2014 it was replaced by the current Orgues Létourneau instrument, conceived as an Anglo-American hybrid specially suited to accompanying Anglican style services. Initially underpowered when the room was full of singers and worshipers, it suffered extensive water damage from an October 2019 tornado that tore through north Dallas and sliced off bricks and roofing from the chapel. The organ had to be dismantled and returned to Létourneau's Quebec facilities for a complete rebuilding. Reinstalled in the chapel in spring 2022, the organ was revoiced for a much more satisfying effect in the room.

A Dutch native, Dr. Robert August serves as Assistant Director of Music and Organist at Saint Michael and All Angels Church. He has performed in Europe and the United States and has toured and recorded with the Harvard University Choir, the Harvard Baroque Chamber Orchestra, the Texas Boys Choir, the Texas Camerata, and made guest appearances with the Fort Worth and Irving Symphonies. While pursuing his doctoral degree at the New England Conservatory of Music, he served as Assistant University Organist and Choirmaster at The Memorial Church at Harvard University, and served as Music Tutor at Harvard's Dunster House. His doctoral thesis, "An Old Look at Schumann's Organ Works," was published in the United States and Europe, celebrating the composer's 200th birthday. Robert frequently serves as adjudicator for choral and organ competitions. He often concertizes with his wife, Dolores, performing a variety of music from early to modern, including organ, piano, harpsichord, flute, and baroque flute.

The Rev. Dr. Christopher D. Girata was called to be the eighth Rector of Saint Michael and All Angels in 2016. Previously he served as Rector of Calvary Episcopal Church in downtown Memphis, Tennessee, a position he had held since 2012. Prior to becoming Calvary's Rector he was Associate Rector of St. Luke's in Birmingham, Alabama, and a seminarian at The National Cathedral in Washington, D.C., and St. John's in Chevy Chase, Maryland.

Dr. Girata received his Bachelor of Arts in religious studies, in honorus, from Stetson University, a Master of Theological Studies from Emory University, a Master of Divinity, cum laude, from Virginia Theological Seminary, and his Doctorate of Ministry from Duke University. He is recognized as a rising leader in the Episcopal Church, presenting regularly at church-wide conferences, seminars and retreats, and the Consortium for Endowed Episcopal Parishes.

Dr. Girata is a native of Florida, a classically trained musician, and an amateur cook. He and his wife, Nicole, have three children: Brayden, Layna, and Annemarie.

Dr. Margaret "Meg" Harper is Associate Director of Music and Organist at Saint Michael and All Angels. Here, she helps oversee Saint Michael's thriving and diverse music department. She assists in all areas of programming, but has particular focus on education, including the chorister program and adult education classes focused on music. Margaret has also just finished a year as Visiting Lecturer of Organ at Baylor University in Waco. As a solo artist, she has performed in the U.S., Europe, and Asia and is on the roster of the Concert Artist Collaborative. She has been hailed by The Diapason magazine for her "impeccable" playing and by the Boston Musical Intelligencer for "outstandingly lively, punchy" performances. Meg holds a DMA and a Performer's Certificate from the Eastman School of Music. She serves in leadership roles for the Association of Anglican Musicians, the Royal School of Church Music, and the American Guild of Organists.

Jonathan Ryan has served as Director of Music and Organist at Saint Michael and All Angels Episcopal Church in Dallas since 2017. At Saint Michael, he has led the establishment of a new RSCM-based chorister program for ages 4 to 18, founded the professional Compline Choir, expanded the music staff and choral liturgies, conducted the first concert by church choirs in this century, and recently commissioned 9 works to celebrate the church's 75th anniversary. A graduate of the Cleveland Institute of Music and Eastman School of Music, he holds six First Prize awards in major national and international organ competitions, and has performed as a solo organ recitalist at prominent venues throughout North America and Europe. Equally at home on the podium, the 2022-2023 season saw him serve as Guest Director of the Dallas Symphony Chorus. In an area dominated by churches of quasi-Gothic, Georgian and Spanish Colonial styles – and, well, others that look like convention centers – **Saint Michael's** elegant modernist church is a standout. Dedicated in 1961, 16 years after the parish's founding, the main part of the complex was designed by Dallas architect Harwood K. Smith. The church's Carrara marble reredos, sculpted by Charles Umlauf, portrays the four archangels Michael, Gabriel, Raphael and Uriel in awe of the giant off-center gold cross. Vivid abstract stained-glass windows were designed by artist Cecil Casebier. John Szymak crafted the aumbry, altar and pavement candlesticks and baptismal font in silver with blue enamel inlays.

The grand space prompts expectations of similarly grand acoustics, but the nave's initial reverberation was too much for early 1960s tastes. Undulating rows of slats added to side walls energize the space visually, but are all too effective at breaking up and trapping sounds. The parish is also home to Saint Michael Episcopal School, for children from 12 months through kindergarten.

The French-accented organ in the rear gallery, completed in 1985, was the largest instrument built by the

late Schudi Organ Co. of Dallas. It recycled some 30 ranks from its predecessor, a 1961 Möller which, under the influence of Ernest White, had no 8' principal on any of its four manual divisions. 19 bells cast in England were installed in the tower in 1996. Saint Michael Chapel, opened in 1948, houses a 2004 Létourneau organ inspired by Cavaillé-Coll *orgues de choeur*, but tuned in Vallotti temperament.

Käthe Wright Kaufman is the Associate Director of Music at Glenn Memorial UMC and Chapel Organist at the Candler School of Theology, both on the campus of Emory University in Atlanta, GA. She previously served as Organ Scholar at Peterborough Cathedral (2019–20), St. Paul's, Rochester, NY (2018–19) and Truro Cathedral (2016–2017). A native of Chicago, Käthe grew up singing in the choir of St. Luke's, Evanston, where she also began her organ studies. She completed both her Bachelor of Music and Master of Music at the Eastman School of Music, studying with William Porter, Edoardo Bellotti, and David Higgs. Käthe has performed around America and the UK, including at Grace Cathedral, San Francisco; St. Philip's Cathedral, Atlanta; and St Michael's, Cornhill. She was recently featured at the American Guild of Organists' National Convention (2022). Käthe is an Associate of the AGO and a published composer with Selah Publishing Company.

First worshiping in 1941 in a temporary wooden building in a neighborhood then sparsely populated, the parish of Christ the King soon developed a master plan for a permanent church, school and other facilities. The present church, designed by Cincinnati architect Edward Schulte and dedicated in 1955, is luxuriously appointed in a late Art Deco interpretation of Romanesque. Backed by mosaic effects in gold leaf, the enormous image of Christ the King over the altar was painted by Leo Cartwright. Due to acoustically absorptive ceiling panels, the church is less reverberant than its dimensions imply. But panels in the back three bays were hardened before the current organ installation, helping sonic projection and presence. Replacing the church's original 1955 Casavant organ, the 2014 Juget-Sinclair in the rear gallery was designed in consultation with Jesse Eschbach, professor of organ at the University of North Texas College of Music. Its stoplist is specifically geared to French repertory from the classic period to Messiaen and beyond.

ST. PHILIP THE APOSTLE CATHOLIC CHURCH Flower Mound, Texas



St. Philip's is home to 3200 families, located in one of the fastest-growing areas of the country. But things didn't start out that way... The fledgling congregation held its first mass in November 1967 and built their first church in 1971. Larger churches were built in 1977 and again in 1997, but within two decades the parish

churches were built in 1977, and again in 1997, but while two decades in parisin had outgrown their *third* building. Phase I of a new parish campus, including the 800-seat rear half of the church nave was completed in 2022. Future plans include a 1000-seat Phase II parish hall plus completion of the church to add up to 1000 more seats.

We joined the project part-way through design and were delighted to find a pastor who embraced time-honored building forms and championed traditional Catholic liturgical music led by choir and organ. A generous natural acoustic to support the liturgy and congregational singing was an essential component. The architects brought a solid understanding of historic church design as viewed through a 21st-Century aesthetic lens, and employed practical, affordable, modern construction techniques to realize an excellent compromise of the many competing architectural, engineering, liturgical, acoustical, musical and spoken word requirements.


The scale of this parish church is vast, even at half its final length: 95' long x 75' wide x 78' high. Walls are built up from multiple layers of cement board and dense drywall. The organ chamber has four total layers on heavy-gauge steel framing isolated from adjacent



offices. 3"-thick laminated tongue & groove southern pine is used for the exposed roof deck. The floor is polished concrete. Walnut pews have no pads. Fullbandwidth reverberance exceeds 5 seconds (unoccupied). Phase I of a new Casavant pipe organ was re-cently completed. We also designed a speech-reinforcement sound system for intelligibility of the spoken word from the sanctuary, plus balcony voice-amplifica-tion for cantors. Now, St. Philip's can really grow!

She currently lives in New Hampshire where she bases her freelance career of performing, teaching, composing, and writing, and is represented by Karen McFarlane Artists.

Barbara Crafton is an Episcopal priest, writer and spiritual director with a particular love of church musi-

cians, artists and actors. She is the author of many books, and for decades has led retreats through the United States and abroad. The ways in which the arts nourish and express a life of faith usually form the content of her talks. She has served a number of New York parishes, including Trinity Church Wall Street, St John's in the Village and St Clement's in the theatre district, as well as St James, the American church in Florence. She was a maritime chaplain on the New York waterfront and a chaplain at Ground Zero after the destruction of the World Trade Center.

Hailed as "an expert at defining darks, lights, shadows and colors," (Birmingham News, Alabama), Bradley Hunter Welch is increasingly in demand as a recitalist, concerto soloist, and collaborative artist. He was named Resident Organist and holder of the Lay Family Chair by the Dallas Symphony Orchestra in 2018, where he performs with the DSO and oversees the Meyerson Symphony Center's Lay Family Concert Organ, built by C.B. Fisk. Dr. Welch also serves as Artist-in-Residence at Preston Hollow Presbyterian Church in Dallas. A native of Knoxville, TN, Dr. Welch holds the Doctor of Musical Arts, Master of Musical Arts, and Master of Music degrees, as well as the coveted Artist Diploma from Yale University where he studied with Thomas Murray and Martin Jean. He also holds the Bachelor of Music degree from Baylor University where he studied with Joyce Jones. His recordings are on the Loft and Pro Organo labels.

Bradley Hunter Welch is represented in North America exclusively by Phillip Truckenbrod Concert Artists, LLC.

Although the Dallas Symphony Orchestra is one of the oldest in the country, dating its founding to 1900, it never had an acoustically satisfying place to play until the 1989 opening of the **Meyerson**. I.M. Pei was selected as architect, on the revolutionary condition that acoustical consultant Russell Johnson be an equal partner in the design. The only concert hall ever designed by Pei, a devoted music lover, the resulting building is an elegant concatenation of angles and curves, glass and limestone. A vast lobby gives way to a sumptuous, high ceilinged performance space, finished in two kinds of mahogany, with backlit onyx details. Overhead is an enormous acoustical canopy soon jokingly dubbed the Starship Enterprise.

To vary sonic perspectives, the four sections of the canopy can be individually raised, lowered and tilted by remote control. (The canopy is fully raised for solo organ performances.) Behind grilles circling the top of the room are heavy concrete doors, also remotely controlled, that can open or close off big concrete rooms to add or subtract up to three seconds-plus of reverberation. Heavy curtains can be drawn over the concert hall walls and inside the reverberance chambers for further acoustical variability.

Towering over the stage and choral terrace, with 32' Prestant pipes in the facade, the Meyerson's 1992 C.B. Fisk organ is as commanding visually as sonically. After generations of concert hall organs that couldn't stand up to the power of modern orchestras, the Fisk supplied revolutionary heft and force, with turbo-charged principal choruses, potent reeds in Résonance and Tuba divisions, and a 32' Tuba Profunda of major seismic impact. There are in effect two Great divisions, one so named in German style, the other the Résonance with a French specification. In retrospect, the power of the instrument may have been too much of a good thing, lacking some subtler effects, but it's a bold solo instrument and can add visceral effects to orchestral music. The dramatic impact of the Meyerson instrument inspired a worldwide proliferation of bigger, bolder concert hall organs. (The next Fisk, Opus 101, went to Southern Methodist University's Caruth Auditorium; it replaced the 1965 Aeolian-Skinner Op. 1438, which was moved to St. Luke's Episcopal Church.)

For decades, the Dallas Museum of Art was housed at Fair Park, a spectacular collection of Art Deco buildings a couple miles east of downtown. The Dallas Symphony Orchestra and Dallas Opera performed in the Music Hall there. But by the late 1970s the inadequacies of those facilities in a decaying area of the city were harder to ignore.

Spearheaded by unusually enlightened civic leaders, a pair of studies recommended establishing a new cultural district, mixing arts and commercial buildings, inside the northeast corner of the downtown freeway loop. Over four decades, starting in the early 1980s, the district gradually accumulated arts facilities designed by international "starchitects," plus infill of commercial and residential highrises. Distinguished both visually and acoustically, the performing arts facilities are among the finest anywhere.

First of the new arts facilities was the Dallas Museum of Art (1984, Edward Larrabee Barnes, expanded in 1993), followed by the Morton H. Meyerson Symphony Center (1989, I.M. Pei), the Crow Museum of Asian Art (1998, Booziotis and Company, in the base of the highrise Trammel Crow Center, 1985, Skidmore, Owings & Merrill), the Nasher Sculpture Center (2003, Renzo Piano, with landscape architect Peter Walker), expansion of the Booker T. Washington High School for the Performing and Visual Arts (2006, Brad Cloepfil/Allied Works Architecture), the Margot and Bill Winspear Opera House (2009, Spencer de Grey/Foster + Partners), the elaborately reconfigurable Dee and Charles Wyly Theatre (2009, Joshua Prince-Ramus/REX/OMA), the outdoor Annette Strauss Square (2010, Foster + Partners) and Moody Performance Hall (2012, Skidmore, Owings & Merrill).

Just north of the **Arts District**, on a deck covering three blocks of the sunken Woodall Rodgers Freeway, is Klyde Warren Park. Designed by the Office of James Burnett, landscape architects, and opened in 2012, the wildly popular park links Downtown with the explosion of new development in Uptown. "F or the sacred musician, the expression of beauty forms a thin place where the veil between the holy and the human is traversed. Music knits together the physical and the spiritual worlds so that we can transcend the ordinary for a glimpse of the infinite.

A native of Washington and Oregon, Dr. Damin Spritzer is Area Chair and Associate Professor of Organ at the University of Oklahoma and Artist-in-Residence for Cathedral Arts at Saint Matthew's Episcopal Cathedral in Dallas. She has performed in Israel, Italy, Germany, Brazil, Norway, France, England, Belgium, Iceland, and throughout the US. She has released six critically acclaimed CDs for Raven Recordings recorded in France, the United States, and England, and publishes an ongoing series of critical editions of the music of R.L. Becker. Her Doctor of Musical Arts degree is from the University of North Texas in Denton, Texas, her MM in Organ Performance from the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, New York, and her BM in Organ Performance from the Oberlin Conservatory of Music in Oberlin, Ohio. Devoted to researching and performing unknown and underrepresented composers, she serves active roles with the Association of Anglican Musicians, the American Guild of Organists, and the Organ Historical Society, is a member of the Society of Women Organists and the American Theatre Organ Society, and a supporting member of Organ Media Foundation and Pipedreams.

Founded in 1974, the Episcopal School of Dallas is an independent coeducational day school with some 1,200 students ages 3 through grade 12. Buildings and facilities have been added over the years, including All Saints

In the sonically sumptuous environment, the modest two-manual Noack organ, from 2002, has no need of forcing, the horizontal Violeta stop adding a piquant zip to the sound.

PROGRAM NOTES

Along with ten of England's most eminent composers, Michael Tippett was commissioned to compose a "modern madrigal" commemorating the 1952 coronation of Queen Elizabeth II. The anthology, *A Garland for the Queen*, was modeled deliberately after the 1601 collection of madrigals composed in honor of Queen Elizabeth I, *The Triumphs of Oriana*. Alongside contributions by Vaughan Williams, Howells, and Finzi, Tippett's **Dance, Clarion Air** recaptures the rhythmic and contrapuntal vitality of its Renaissance counterparts.

This sweet and merry month of May is one of William Byrd's best-known secular pieces. Pressured to compose the piece as a contribution to Thomas Watson's *Italian Madrigals Englished* (1590), Byrd took the opportunity to flatter Queen Elizabeth (from whom he had earned great favor and a monopoly on all music printing in England). Like the Italian madrigal style he was meant to imitate, the piece is driven by imitative polyphony and quick metric changes. Byrd eventually brings all voices together after a pause to salute the "beauteous Queen of second Troy" (Queen Elizabeth; 'second Troy' being London).

Known for its haunting melodic lines and warm lyricism, Cecilia McDowall's choral music has been commissioned, performed, and recorded regularly by the world's finest ensembles, including the BBC Singers, The Sixteen, and Trinity College, Cambridge. **The Lord is Good** is an expansive setting of verses from the Book of Lamentations, featuring an interlacing and exotic soprano duet over a rich and sometimes highly dissonant choral backdrop.

Ave verum corpus exemplifies Byrd's ability to create unparalleled beauty within the simplest of textures. The

motet for four voices uses moments of duets to beg for mercy ("*miserere*") with brief pangs of dissonance. Jamaican-Welsh composer and singer, Roderick Williams, has become an in-demand Baritone soloist and composer on the BBC Proms stage and across Great Britain. His **Ave verum corpus Re-Imagined** expands Byrd's texture into three choirs. Instead of masking dissonance, the choirs overlap one another in deliberate polytonal clusters. Later, six falling treble lines paint the image of the blood flowing from Christ's pierced side ("*unda fluxit sanguine*").

Herbert Howells was commissioned to write a piece *in memoriam* of President John F. Kennedy to be performed on the first anniversary of his death, November 22, 1964. **Take Him, Earth, for Cherishing** sweeps from body to spirit, the dialogue painted with chord shifts that almost lift you from your seat. Howells was known to be preoccupied with thoughts of death and the afterlife; he was best known for *Hymnus Paradisi*, composed as a means of healing from the death of his young son. "Take Him, Earth" also became so significant to the composer that it was performed at his own funeral twenty years later.

Anglo-Canadian composer, Healey Willan, described his provenance: "English by birth; Canadian by adoption; Irish by extraction; Scotch by absorption." His most acclaimed choral piece among hundreds, **An Apostrophe to the Heavenly Hosts** uses text drawn from translated Eastern Orthodox liturgies and is set for double chorus with brief "mystic" choruses. Also like the Eastern Orthodox music tradition, the texture is extremely expansive, yet rather conservative in its harmonic language.

Te lucis ante terminum is a chant meant for the evening prayers of the Compline Service. Tallis' setting alternates between Gregorian chant and compact,

simplified polyphony—a stark contrast to his illustriously broader music, but no less stirring. Alec Roth is best known in Great Britain for his operas, but has composed in an array of genres ranging from chamber music to Javanese gamelan. His setting of **Night Prayer** compliments the free-form nature of the same chant melody with imitative lines, an accompanying bass foundation, and soaring soprano descant.

Gustav Holst was born into a family of accomplished musicians and studied piano, harp, and organ with his father. He attended the Royal College of Music under the tutelage of Charles Stanford and Hubert Parry before befriending Ralph Vaughan Williams. Together, they began collecting and reviving English folk songs while Holst also studied Hindu literature, philosophy, and Sanskrit at University College, London. Nunc Dimittis was first performed in 1915 at Westminster Cathedral's Easter Sunday service. It was promptly forgotten until Holst's daughter recreated the lost score for its revival by the BBC Singers in 1974. The role of the Nunc Dimittis within the Anglican rite of Evensong has prompted settings by all the major English composers, though most interesting in Holst's setting is the dichotomy of styles: the prayer begins with a colorful and reflectively slow construction of a thirteenth chord before later developing into imitative, polychoral writing that reflects the composer's deep attachment to the music of the English Renaissance.

It would have been rare for an Elizabethan play to not contain at least one song. Shakespeare and other playwrights simply added new rhymes to existing tunes that would have been instantly familiar to the audience, though some historians believe Shakespeare may have composed a number of his own ballads. Nonetheless, his poetry has inspired countless composers for centuries. Matthew Harris' distinctive voice in his five books of Shakespeare songs is influenced by his love of rock and roll and jazz. The clown, Feste, closes Twelfth Night by singing When that I was and a little tiny boy. The keen yet playful text reminds us all life's festivities are only short-lived; indeed, "the rain it raineth every day." Harris begins this setting with Feste's very plain tenor narration before building to a grand assemblage of sixteen parts, appropriate for the finale of the play. When daffodils begin to peer opens Act III of The Winter's Tale. Autolycus welcomes springtime, "the sweet of the year," during which he can chase after women, engage in thievery, and drink ale.

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J.D. Burnett enjoys a varied career as a conductor, singer, and teacher. He was named Orpheus's Artistic Director in March 2021 and assumed the role on January 1, 2022. Burnett is also Director of Choral Activities at the University of Texas at Austin Butler School of Music. In addition, he is the founding Artistic Director of Kinnara, Atlanta's premier professional chamber choir.

Formerly, he was Associate Professor of Music and Associate Director of Choral Activities at the University of Georgia Hugh Hodgson School of Music. He has served as Assistant Director of the Dallas Symphony Chorus, conductor of the New Jersey Youth Chorus Young Men's Ensemble, Associate Conductor of the Masterwork Chorus of New Jersey, and Acting Director of Choral Activities at Montclair State University. Earlier posts include Interim Director of Choral Activities at San Jose State University, Artistic Director of the New Jersey Chamber Singers, Music Director of the Houston Masterworks Chorus, and Founder of Men's Consort Houston. He also served as Choral Editor at McGraw-Hill, Inc.

Burnett did undergraduate study at Stanford University and Oklahoma State University. He holds advanced degrees in choral conducting from Westminster Choir College and the University of North Texas.

As a professional choral singer, Burnett has performed and recorded with the Stillwater Chamber Singers, Cantare

Houston, Fuma Sacra, Robert Shaw Festival Singers, Choir of Trinity Church Wall Street, Oregon Bach Festival Chorus, Santa Fe Desert Chorale, and Conspirare.

Orpheus Chamber Singers, Inc., is the premier professional choir in North Texas, committed to performances and activities that perpetuate and elevate the art of choral music. Since its first concert in 1995, Orpheus has presented a multi-concert subscription series each year to great critical acclaim. Orpheus has performed throughout the Dallas-Fort Worth area at venues including the regional conference of the American Choral Directors Association, the Dallas Museum of Art, the Kimbell Museum of Art, UT-Southwestern Medical Center, Children's Medical Center-Dallas, and numerous public schools. Collaborations over our 27+ year history have included Ars Lyrica Houston, Gramophone Award-winning Baroque scholar John Butt, Texas Camerata, jazz pianist Eric Barnes, hand drummer and international percussionist Jamal Mohamed, tanpura player Vatsal Dave, and many other outstanding instrumentalists. Founding Artistic Director Donald Krehbiel retired from Orpheus in December 2021. Following a national search, J.D. St. Thomas Aquinas originated as a school, in 1947. After a few years of services held in the school auditorium, the parish dedicated the present church, designed by Oklahoma City architect C.L. Monnot in a reserved adaption of Gothic style, in 1957. The church's spacious, lofty interior and hard surfaces provide a rich but clear acoustic especially popular for choral concerts. Additional buildings and facilities have been added over the years, and in 2005 the parish acquired the former First Community Church, half a mile away on Mockingbird Avenue, to use for its Lower School.

The Schudi organ in the rear gallery, originally installed in 1978, betrays influences from French Neoclassic instruments, its unforced foundations capped with brassy reeds and brilliant upperwork. In 1986–87 Schudi added the Trompette en Chamade, an 8' Flute harmonique and, in the Pedal, more Frenchified 16' and 32' Bombardes. With an expressive Positif and a third manual controlling only the Chamade and a V-rank Cornet, the organ is far more versatile than its modest specification would suggest. It attracted national attention via Todd Wilson's 1986 Delos recording of the complete organ works of Maurice Duruflé. In 2015 the church acquired a Gabriel Kney positive organ. And the chapel of what's now the Lower School has organs by Holtkamp and Möller.

After recent years of mechanical problems, the Schudi organ will be dismantled and completely restored by Casavant following the AAM Conference. The project will include a new console and computerized control system, plus a new 17 rank Récit expressif in an adjacent chamber. In modified Cavaillé-Coll style, the new division will be scaled and voiced to complement the more Classic aesthetic of the 1978 instrument.

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

The Elephant in the Room: A Dialogue on Things We'd Rather Not Talk About A Presentation by the Professional Concerns and Development Committee

Interlocutors: Sonya Subbayya Sutton and the Rt. Rev. Daniel G.P. Gutiérrez Moderator: John DeDakis

The Episcopal Church is inherently a hierarchical church, where rectors of parishes hold canonical authority over worship and music. This can, at times, lead to tension between musicians and clergy, especially when power and authority are not used appropriately or even abused. What do musicians do when they are being unfairly treated by clergy who are their bosses? How do clergy deal gracefully with musicians who are not collaborative? Although our church is one "of bishops," bishops are often reluctant to intervene in working situations that have gone amiss in order to avoid undermining the canonical authority of rectors. Is there a way out of these seemingly intractable problems? Can there be mutual ministry and collaboration in a church that is hierarchical and in which rectors are given substantial power? This presentation will be an honest and frank dialogue between a bishop and a lay church musician, exploring ways in which we might move forward for the health of the church and for the sake of the Gospel.

Pianist, organist, and conductor Sonya Subbayya Sutton has enjoyed a 40+ year career as a musician in the Episcopal Church, including twenty years at St. Alban's in Washington, D.C. More recently she has been called to interim music ministry, working with music programs in transition. She also currently serves as president of the Association of Anglican Musicians, a national membership organization of Episcopal church musicians. Since 2013 she has been Music Director of the World Bank/IMF Chorus, and frequently collaborates with other instrumentalists as an accompanist and chamber musician. Sonya has directed choirs in seven European tours and cathedral residencies, and participated as organist or singer in four more, making music in the great cathedrals of Great Britain, France, the Czech Republic, Austria, Italy, and South Africa. She enjoys writing about the intersection of life and the arts, and has published two audiobooks on Audible with music and stories about French composer Mel Bonis in Difficult Women...Legends Revised and a set of 24 short stories based on music of John Hausserman titled Symphonic Preludes. Sonya earned degrees in piano, organ, and arts administration from the College-Conservatory of Music in Cincinnati. She lives in Washington D.C. and is married to Eugene Sutton, the Episcopal Bishop of Maryland. They have four adult children in their blended

family, and will soon begin spending part of each year in Chautauqua, New York.

The Rt. Rev. Daniel G. P. Gutiérrez was ordained on July 16, 2016, as the 16th bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Pennsylvania, the second oldest and fourth largest in the Episcopal Church. Gutiérrez emphasizes evangelism, discipleship, innovation, creativity, accountability, adaptability, integrity and hope. He restructured the Diocesan offices to better serve its parishes without increasing the budget and intensified staff efforts towards serving the people of the diocese. Ninety percent of staff time is spent among the diocese's churches – assisting, supporting and envisioning.

Since his ordination, hundreds of ministerial goals have been realized, the diocese was incorporated, the budget was unified and all finances were made available for monthly review. Before his calling as bishop, Gutiérrez had a distinguished career in both The Episcopal Church and in public service in New Mexico. Rebuilding and growing churches were the hallmark of his time in key leadership positions at The Episcopal Diocese of the Rio Grande. At the request of the Presiding Bishop, he served in an administrative oversight position for The Episcopal Church in Navajoland, which included being

vice president of the Navajoland Economic Development Corporation. His career in public service included serving as chief of staff to the Mayor of Albuquerque and Director of Economic Development. In 2022, he served as chair of The Social Justice and International Policy Committee for the 80th General Convention of The Episcopal Church. He currently serves as president of The Compass Rose Society, which supports the work of the Archbishop of Canterbury and the Anglican Communion throughout the world, and was appointed by the Archbishop of Canterbury and the General Secretary of the Anglican Consultative Council to serve on the Church Growth and Planting Commission for the Anglican Communion. He is chair of the Board of Trustees for Episcopal Community Services, The Church Foundation, and the Widows Corporation. He serves as a board member for The American Friends of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem, The Church Farm School, and The Episcopal Academy. He also is a trustee of the General Seminary of The Episcopal Church. In addition, Gutiérrez is a conferee of the Venerable Order of St. John; a co-convener of the Bishops United Against Gun Violence; a member of the Religious Leaders Council of Philadelphia; and Vicar-General of the British Officers Club of Philadelphia. He received Bachelor of Arts degrees in Political Science and History and a Master of Public Administration (concentration in budgeting), all from the University of New Mexico. While at the University of New Mexico, he was named a Graduate Scholars Fellow. Gutiérrez earned a diocesan certificate in Anglican Studies through the Trinity School for Ministry and a Master in Theological Studies from St. Norbert College.

Founded in 1874, Oak Lawn United Methodist Church has worshiped in the present Protestant-Gothic sanctuary since 1915. It was designed by the prolific Dallas architect C.D. Hill, also responsible for two landmark buildings downtown: the Beaux Arts Dallas Municipal Building and the elegantly classical First Presbyterian Church. The Oak Lawn complex was expanded in 1929 and 1950. The church's interior has a lively acoustic quite unusual for a building of its type and age.

One of the last organs built by M.P. Möller before its 1992 bankruptcy, the Oak Lawn instrument was installed in 1994 under auspices of King of Instruments, Inc., an umbrella corporation that for a time attempted to continue Möller's work. Approximately one third of its stops are digital.



Jeremy is on the international roster of Steinway Artists, and has appeared as a solo pianist in Russia, Finland, Sweden, Norway, France, Germany, New Zealand, Australia, and throughout the USA and UK. He has over 35 solo recordings on piano and organ. Gramophone magazine described his recordings of Marcel Duprés complete organ works (Guild) as "one of the greatest achievements in organ recording". He studied as an Organ Scholar at Keble College, Oxford and completed graduate studies in piano performance at the Royal College of Music in London. His PhD in Musicology was awarded by the Birmingham City University/Conservatoire.

Jeremy Filsell is represented in North America exclusively by Phillip Truckenbrod Concert Artists, LLC.

Theodore Harvey, Associate Principal Cello of the Dallas Symphony Orchestra, has performed as a soloist, chamber musician and orchestra member throughout North America, South America and Europe. As Assistant Principal Cellist of the Charlotte Symphony from 2004 to 2008 he frequently performed major orchestral solos and was also active as a chamber musician and as an organist in local churches.

Mr. Harvey holds a bachelor's degree from the Indiana University School of Music, from which he graduated with highest distinction in 2000, having studied with Janos Starker and Helga Winold. Following his senior recital, he received the Indiana University Performer's Certificate. He completed graduate studies with Joel Krosnick at The Juilliard School in 2002. From 2002 to 2004, Mr. Harvey was a Fellow of the New World Symphony in Miami Beach, Florida.

In Dallas, Mr. Harvey sang for nine years in the choir of the Church of the Incarnation and twice toured England with the choir, singing at Lichfield and Canterbury cathedrals, Westminster Abbey and St George's Chapel. An avid student of the history of Europe and its royal families, in his spare time he maintains the website www.royaltymonarchy.com. In October 2017, Mr. Harvey was invested as an Honorary Knight of the Royal House of Portugal by HRH the Duke of Braganza.

Maria Schleuning, violinist, has been a member of the Voices of Change Modern Music Ensemble since 1996 and Artistic Director since 2009

An active chamber musician, Ms. Schleuning has performed in venues such as New York's Alice Tully Hall, Weill Hall, Merkin Hall, Avery Fisher Hall, and the



Museum of Modern Art, as well as at numerous festivals throughout the United States and Europe.

A member of the Dallas Symphony since 1994, she has been featured as soloist with the orchestra on many occasions. Other solo highlights include appearances with the Oregon Symphony, Seattle Symphony, West Virginia Symphony, Abilene Symphony, Laredo Symphony, Bozeman Symphony and with the Greater Dallas Youth Orchestra on a tour of Eastern Europe including concerts at the Gewandhaus in Leipzig and the Rudolfinuum in Prague, in addition to a tour of China in 2015. She studied with Josef Gingold at Indiana University, where she was awarded a performer's certificate; with Yfrah Neaman at the Guildhall School in London, with a grant from the Myra Hess Foundation; and with Joel Smirnoff at the Juilliard School, where she received her master's degree.

Bing Wang joined the Dallas Symphony Orchestra in 1997. Born in Shanghai, China, he began his violin studies with his father, Professor De-Wen Wang, and Professor Guimin Xing, at age 4. He is the recipient of the 1991 Davidorff Young Musician of the Year Award (Germany). Wang has played solo and chamber music performances in the U.S., Canada, Japan, Portugal, England, Greece, Germany and Mexico. He earned his bachelor's degree in music from the Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music, with Dorothy DeLay and Kurt Sassmannhaus, and his master's degree from the University of Southern California with Alice Schoenfeld. Wang also studied at Indiana University with Henryk Kowalski. He has one son and one daughter, David and Catherine.

With development starting in the 1920s, suburban Preston Hollow, in northern Dallas above University Park, became a Mecca for well-to-do residents. Founded in 1950, **Preston Hollow Presbyterian** first held services at what is now St. Mark's School of Texas. The distinguished Dallas architect Mark Lemmon, who also designed Highland Park United Methodist and Highland Park Presbyterian churches and several buildings at Southern Methodist University, designed the original church complex in understated Georgian style. Among subsequent additions was a major enlargement of the sanctuary in 2002. With acoustical consulting by Scott Riedel & Associates, expansive space was provided in front for ministers, choirs, organ and extra instrumentalists.

Selected as organbuilder for the expanded sanctuary, Goulding and Wood had the too-rare opportunity to collaborate with architects and acoustician on design and specifications of spaces and acoustics. Inaugurated in 2003, the resulting instrument is an updated version of "American Classic" concepts.

Robert McCormick



The Rev. Dr. Christopher Beeley currently serves as rector of Church of the Incarnation. Previously he served as the Director of the Anglican Episcopal House of Studies and the Jack and Barbara Bovender Professor of Theology, Anglican Studies and Ministry at Duke Divinity School. He and his wife, Shannon, are native Texans with three young adult children, sons Reed and Corin, and daughter Camilla. Dr. Beeley graduated with a B.A. Hons. in Philosophy from Washington and Lee University, an M.Div. from Yale Divinity School, and a Ph.D. from the University of Notre Dame. He was ordained deacon and priest in the Episcopal Diocese of Texas and has served as a priest in eight churches nationwide. Before joining the Duke faculty, he taught for 16 years at Yale Divinity School. The author of several books, Dr. Beeley regularly consults on leadership and program development and speaks nationally and internationally on Christian theology, spirituality, and church leadership.

Dr. Beeley is an orthodox theologian and church leader and is well-known as an accomplished pastor, preacher, author, and trainer of new ministers. His greatest passion is fostering the abundant spiritual growth of God's Church.

Christopher Jacobson is Director of Music and Organist at Church of the Incarnation, Dallas Texas. Active as a versatile concert organist, conductor, and accompanist, he founded the Duke Evensong Singers and played the organ for over 150 services each year as Organist at Duke University Chapel. Mr. Jacobson has performed the complete organ works of Johann Sebastian Bach across the United States and his recordings appear on Pentatone Records. He has worked with conductor Brian A. Schmidt in the Grammy-nominated recording of Marcel Tyberg's Masses.

A Fellow of the Royal College of Organists, Mr. Jacobson was previously Assistant Director of Music at Washington National Cathedral where he played for numerous services including the State Funeral of President Gerald Ford. He is a graduate of the Eastman School of Music and his teachers have included David Higgs, Catherine Rodland, and James Litton as a treble chorister at the American Boychoir School.

Described by Choir & Organ as "indomitable and immensely gifted" and by The Macon Telegraph as "an artist of rare sensitivity and passion", Robert McCormick is heralded as one of the finest concert and church musicians of this era. Widely known for his unique abilities in organ improvisation, Mr. McCormick was a semi-finalist in the 2005 St. Albans International Organ Festival Improvisation Competition, the only American to merit that distinction. He has been featured in solo appearances in San Francisco, New York, Pittsburgh, Dallas, Albuquerque, and Atlanta, and in recitals and workshops for numerous American Guild of Organists chapters, the Association of Anglican Musicians, the Royal School of Church Music in America, and for Westminster Choir College. His recording from St. Paul's, K Street, We Sing of God, was released on the Pro Organo label. Choir & Organ's review

of the disc states that "[McCormick] shines at the organ." Mr. McCormick is Organist and Choirmaster of St. Mark's Episcopal Church in Philadelphia. This follows eight years as Director of Music at St. Paul's Parish, K Street, Washington, D.C., and seven years as Organist and Music Director at the Church of St. Mary the Virgin, New York. He is a graduate of the Westminster Choir College. His teachers include McNeil Robinson and Robert Carwithen.

Robert McCormick is represented in North America exclusively by Phillip Truckenbrod Concert Artists, LLC.

Founded as a downtown chapel in 1879, Incarnation moved to its current site, in what then was considered far north Dallas, in 1927. The original church there is now known as Memorial Chapel. During the 1950s, with the area rapidly growing, the Dallas firm of Thomas Jameson & Merrill designed a grand new Gothic church building, complete with flying buttresses. Budget realities and Korean War limits on materials required scaling back and simplifying the design, although its outlines were preserved. The large parish hall and attached classrooms, in mid-century modern style, were added in the 1960s. In 2015 the parish doubled its footprint with a new welcome center and a three-story complex of classrooms and meeting spaces along a long hallway. Designed by HH Architects, with Gothic allusions here and there, it's terminated on the north end by Ascension Chapel. Although conceived for contemporary "Uptown" services, paradoxically the chapel looks like something out of Percy Dearmer's Parson's Handbook. Two stained glass windows were designed by artisans in Canterbury. Incarnation is also home to Incarnation Academy, for children 12 months through kindergarten.

Incarnation's rather lean-toned 1960 Aeolian-Skinner organ, Op. 1370, was less than ideal for the parish's Angli-

deal of existing pipework, the Noack Organ Co. supplied greatly enriched sonorities in an essentially new organ, with electric-action slider chests and a new console. Twenty years later, the need to address some mechanical problems provided an opportunity to rethink tonal aspects never completely satisfactory in the 1994 project. Noack, now under Didier Grassin, added six new ranks, enhanced the formerly underpowered Swell division with an enlarged enclosure, higher wind pressure and new chorus reeds, and reregulated the entire organ. The result is a plush-toned and colorful instrument ideal for Anglican service playing, but with enough fire to the reeds for French music. Memorial Chapel has a 1969 Wicks organ for which the Texas expression "bless your heart" is all too appropriate.

Data-driven Chorister Recruitment

Presenters: Ruth Cobb and Margaret White

A model for gathering recruitment, enrollment, and retention statistics to develop a plan that will promote a parish chorister program. We will explore variations at the local level and the benefits of data collection to track norms that identify strong and weak points in a process.

Ruth Cobb is currently the interim director of admissions at Saint Thomas Choir School, having held the position from 2002-2014, working with Gerre Hancock and John Scott. During this time, she was the founding manager of the Saint Thomas Girl Chorister Course, now in its 19th year under the co-direction of Rebecca Kellerman-Filsell and Margaret White. In between her tenures at the choir school, she worked with the All Saints' Chapel staff at the University of the South, Sewanee. Originally trained as an organist and church musician, Ruth holds music degrees from Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music and Northwestern University, and was a student in the not-for-profit management course at Northwestern's Kellogg School of Management. She is looking forward to a slower pace of life at home in Florida with her husband, an Episcopal priest, and visits with their three children and five grandchildren.

Margaret White is currently Admission Associate for Financial aid and a member of the residential faculty at Saint Thomas Choir School in New York City. A lifelong New Yorker, Margaret attended the all-girls' Brearley School for thirteen years and then Princeton University, where she earned her A.B. in English. She began her career as a substitute teacher at schools throughout Manhattan, and then spent three years teaching at Marymount School of New York before temporarily relocating to Massachusetts to pursue her Ed.M. in Learning and Teaching at Harvard University. As a school faculty member, a product of single-sex education, and a trained vocal musician herself, she is uniquely positioned to assist in Saint Thomas Choir School's recruitment efforts.

Vocal Methods for Choirs Presenter: Connor Lidell

This workshop is designed to answer your most burning questions about the vocal mechanism in the church choir setting. Topics will include breathing technique, healthy vibrato and straight-tone singing, presbyphonia (the aging voice), how to help your choir achieve unified tone and vowels, and more. There will be a question and answer session following the presentation.

Connor Lidell is a vocal pedagogue and coach in the Dallas-Fort Worth area. His studio includes professional choral singers, Broadway National Tour cast members, collegiate artists in both the classical and music theatre classification, and award-winning high school vocalists. He graduated from the Jacobs School of Music at Indiana University with a Master of Music degree and matriculated to New York University for an Advanced Certificate of Vocal Pedagogy. He specializes in performance excellence, working on deep-level artistry and creativity to help students find their unique voice. His research also centers on the use of the digital-age voice studio and how it can be optimized with the collaborative spirit of the pre-1900s vocal studio model. He is also a recitalist and solo concert singer. Recent concerts: Penderecki *Passio*, Vaughan-Williams *Sea Symphony*, and Fauré *Requiem*. Recent operatic roles: Swallow in *Peter Grimes*, L'horloge comtoise in Ravel's *L'enfant*, and Nick Shadow in Stravinsky's *The Rake's Progress*. He serves as a staff singer and vocal coach at Saint Michael and All Angels Episcopal Church in Dallas.

Four of your AAM colleagues will share tips from their multiple sabbatical experiences. Whether or not your parish has an active sabbatical program for clergy and lay employees, this information will be helpful in understanding this important tool for reinvigorating oneself for continued ministry in church music.

Jason Abel has been the Director of Music at Christ Church in Alexandria, Virginia, since 2005. In this role, he functions as principal organist and directs the church's three choirs. He holds a Master's degree, cum laude, from Southern Methodist University, and a Bachelor's degree from the University of the South in Sewanee, Tennessee. In addition to his work at Christ Church, Jason serves as an assistant chapel organist at Virginia Theological Seminary and is one of the ceremonial organists at Arlington National Cemetery.

Bruce J. Barber II currently serves as Director of Music and Organist at historic Christ Church Christiana Hundred in Greenville, Delaware. He previously served as Director of Music at St James Cathedral, Chicago, Illinois, and the Cathedral Church of St. John, Albuquerque, New Mexico. At Christ Church, he directs both professional and volunteer choirs. He is also responsible for the Christ Church Concert Series which features the choirs of Christ Church, organists from around the globe, and various instrumentalists from the greater Philadelphia/Wilmington metroplex. He has led the Christ Church Choir in Choral Residencies at Bristol Cathedral and Westminster Abbey (2018) and at St. Paul's Cathedral, London (2022). Trained as a choral and orchestral conductor, an organist and cellist, Mr. Barber holds degrees from Rollins College, Yale School of Music, and the Yale Institute of Sacred Music.

With heartfelt joy, during this time period an increasing visibility of women composers was noted in sacred choral music lists shared by AAM members. This workshop, from the founder of A Great Host, surveys the origin of the project and its name, highlights historical and contemporary sacred works of the database, offers St. Paul's Burlingame, CA as an example for introducing women composers to a small parish, and discusses the creative continuation of the work of A Great Host, from a day or month of music by women composers to all twelve months, from a specialized list to an integrated catalogue.

Susan Jane Matthews is Director of Music at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Burlingame, California, and founding director of the St. Paul's Choir School. She has led the Choir of St. Paul's in two residencies (Gloucester and Wells Cathedrals), two CDs, and two commissioned works. She previously served as Director of Music at St. Michael's Episcopal Cathedral, Boise; and Principal Organist of Grace Cathedral, San Francisco, where she recorded two organ CDs. Dr. Matthews is a graduate of Haverford College (BA), Eastman School of Music (MM, DMA), and an Associate of the Royal School of Church Music (ARSCM). A passionate advocate for women musicians, she has highlighted their music in performances as organist and pianist, written articles on girl choristers, Fanny Hensel and other women composers (RSCM Church Music Quarterly, AAM Journal); and founded *A Great Host of Women Composers Database* (www.greathostcomposer.org). THE SECOND LESSON

The Rev. Ted Clarkson is a life-long Episcopalian and the newest member of the clergy at Transfiguration. Fr. Ted graduated from Southern Methodist University with an undergraduate degree in music and the University of the South, Sewanee with a Master of Divinity. Before ordination, he was an instructor for The Way at Transfiguration and the Director of Children and Youth Ministries at All Saints' Episcopal Church in Fort Worth.

Stefan Engels was appointed Professor of Organ and L. Fullinwider Centennial Chair in Music Performance at SMU in Dallas, TX, in 2014, where he is also chair of the Organ Department at the Meadows School of the Arts. Prior to that he held Professorships at the University of Music and Performing Arts in Leipzig and at Westminster Choir College in Princeton, NJ. He is also Artist in Residence at the Episcopal Church of the Transfiguration in Dallas. Mr. Engels has recorded the complete organ works of Sigfrid Karg-Elert (Priory) and has begun recording the complete organ works of J. S. Bach (Motette). Among his teachers were Wolfgang Rübsam and the late Robert Anderson. Mr. Engels was awarded the "Concerto Gold Medal" at the 1998 Calgary International Organ Competition. Since then, he has been represented by Karen McFarlane Artists Inc. of Cleveland, Ohio.



Joel Martinson has held the position of Director of Music and Organist at the Episcopal Church of the Transfiguration in Dallas since June 2004. He coordinates the musical life of this vibrant parish, as well as the music series *Transfigured Nights*. He led Transfiguration's new organ project, culminating in Richards, Fowkes & Co.'s Opus 17. An active composer, he has been commissioned by churches, music organizations and individual performers across the USA.

His award-winning compositions have been featured at conventions of American professional and denominational musicians' associations and have been performed on five continents. He holds Bachelor and Master of Music degrees in Organ Performance from The University of North Texas, where he studied under Charles S. Brown. www.joelmartinson.com and www.kesslerparkpress.com.

The Rev. Dr. R. Casey Shobe became the fourth rector of Transfiguration in October 2014 after having served churches in Rhode Island and Houston. He is married to Melody Shobe, also an Episcopal priest, and they have two daughters, Isabelle and Adelaide. Casey grew up in Temple, Texas, and holds a Bachelor of Arts from the University of Texas at Austin. His Master of Divinity was earned at Virginia Theological Seminary and his Doctor of Ministry at the School of Theology at the University of the South (Sewanee). He loves playing golf, road cycling, hiking, brewing beer, and working in his yard.

The Rev. Rebecca Tankersley is the Senior Associate Rector of Episcopal Church of the Transfiguration in Dallas. She joined Transfiguration in May 2018 after having served several churches in the Dallas area. She has served on the Episcopal Diocese of Dallas Finance Committee and Executive Council, and this year served as a Deputy to General Convention. Rebecca is married to Scott, an attorney, and they have three sons. A native Bostonian, Rebecca moved to Dallas as a toddler (as quickly as she could). At age 10, she moved to Michigan where she finished primary school and earned a Bachelor of Arts and a Juris Doctorate from the University of Michigan. She then returned to Dallas where she practiced law for many years before returning to school to earn a Masters of Divinity at Perkins School of Theology at SMU. Rebecca enjoys singing, cycling, hiking, traveling, cooking, and eating.

With explosive postwar growth in far north Dallas, a new Episcopal church was clearly needed. Initially organized as a mission in 1956, **Transfiguration** began building on the southwest corner of Hillcrest and Spring Valley roads. After those buildings were swamped by a catastrophic 1964 flood of adjacent White Rock Creek, the parish acquired higher ground on the opposite side of Spring Valley. Buildings have been added over ensuing decades, including facilities occupied during the week by pre-school through second grade students of Parish Episcopal School. (Grades 3 through 12 are at the separate Midway Campus, on Sigma Road.) The modernist church, dedicated in 1970, was enhanced in the 1980s by altar and triptych paintings in Byzantine iconographic style by artists Charlotte O'Faolain-Hallett and William Hallett.

Although constructed with hard interior surfaces and a high ceiling, when opened the church had surprisingly little reverberation. To improve acoustics in advance of the 2010 Richards, Fowkes & Co. organ, with advice from acoustician Dawn Schuette, the ceiling was reinforced and wooden baffles were added on sides of the nave.

The rear gallery was designed for a substantial Aeolian-Skinner organ, but funds for the project never materialized. The Aeolian-Skinner the church *did* acquire, Op. 1525, was a modest 13-stop tracker designed by Robert L. Sipe, who headed the firm for two years before its 1972 dissolution. This "temporary" instrument served the parish for 40 years, until it was moved to the south transept to make room in the gallery for Richards, Fowkes & Co. Op. 17. The latter instrument is inspired by 17th and 18th century organs in Germany and Netherlands, but with a Swell division and electric stop and combination actions for more versatility; the temperament is Neidhardt for a small city, 1732. The dramatic case, with faux grained red woodwork and baroque carvings, was patterned after two Hinsz organs in the Netherlands.

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
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
